MRS. R. P. STEEVES

Mrs. R., P. Steeves who has been chosen as C.C.F. candidate in the North Shore By-election, needs little infroduction in C.C. F., educational or cultural circles. However, to those who wish to know her more fully the following information may be valuable:

Dorothy G. Steeves was born in Holland of British stock. She was educated in that country and passed there all the earlier period of her life. She is a Doctor of Laws of Leyden University. Her marriage was the result of a war-time meeting in Holland with Mr. R. P. Steeves, while the latter was awaiting exchange after three years as a prisoner of war in Germany. Mrs. Steeves was at that time working for the Dutch government as legal advisor in the office which regulated distribution of food and other commodities scarce in that country during the war years.

Mrs. Steeves came to Canada when her husband, now the principal of the General Gordon School, returned in 1919. Since then she has been actively interested in the work of many public organizations. She is a past president of the Women's International League for Peace, and of the Overseas University Graduates' Association, and is also a foundation member of the International Club, She was secretary of the League of Nations Society, during which period she edited their paper for school-age youth on League of Nations matters.

Before Point Grey amalgamated with the city she was appointed on the Point Grey Town Planning Commission and served in that capacity until that body was suspended by the Greater Vancouver Commission.

MACKENZIE MATHESON

LIBERAL standard-bearer for the constituency of North Vancouver in the by-election caused by the death of H. C. E. Anderson. Mr. Matheson has resided at Caulfeild during the past twenty years. Born in Oxford County, Ontario, he was, educated in the public and high schools of Brandon, Manitoba, and is a graduate in Arts in the university of that province, and is a medalist in the L.L.B. degree of that seat of learning. He was called to the bar in Winnipeg and practised law for a time in Saskatchewan, and during the past twenty-three years in Vancouver.
