## Region's aim could be 12% tax increase

Durham regional council will vote today (Wednesday) on a planning committee recommendation to hold the 1990 Region tax increase to no more than 12 per cent over last year's levy.

A planning staff report had projected an increase of 27.3 per cent, or another \$18.6-million, in a preliminary budget estimate. However, staff also presented alternative percentage guide-lines, including 9, 12 and 15 per cent, and the impacts each would have on 1990 and future spending.

A motion made by regional chairman Gary Herrema at the planning committee session, to establish 10 per cent as the maximum increase, was defeated by committee members. Councillors instead voted to accept a guideline of 12 per cent.

The staff report had recommended against a "low" overall

guideline, such as 9 per cent, saying it would "exacerbate the problem for the 1991 net regional levy," particularly with spending requirements for police, social services, general government and works.

"It should be recognized that the achievement of a single digit guideline for the 1990 net regional levy will require significant expenditure deferrals in the special capital levies," states the planning staff report.

"The expenditure deferrals in the special capital levies for roads, police and homes for the aged would require a re-evaluation of the priority of these capital expenditures. The result of this scenario would be that quality and quantity of regional services could not keep pace with the growth in the region and that existing levels of service could not be maintained."

The Horseless Carriagemen are always looking for new members to join in what they describe as good, clean fun that ultimately benefits children throughout the world.

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
