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A BRIEF HISTORY: Gypsum was first discovered on the Grand river by the surveyor Augustus Jones in April 1793 when he explored the confluence of the Grand and Nith rivers. The first gypsum mine on the Grand river (and probably the first one in Ontario) was opened in 1822 at that same location by William Holme. A year later Holme built the first gypsum mill but he soon sold his mining interests and property to Hiram Caplon who was to found the town of Paris at this same site.

It was not long before gypsum mining flourished all along the Grand river between Cambridge and Dunneville. Mines varied, some were open pits, others small tunnels to satisfy the modest needs of the farmers who owned them, while still others were extensive underground workings sometimes penetrating a quarter mile or more following the layers of gypsum. However, by about 1920 there were only a half dozen or so still open and today there are only two mines still being worked and they are thoroughly modern operations.

The old mines had been forgotten to all but a few.

THE GRAND RIVER HERITAGE MINES SOCIETY has recently been formed to collect record and preserve artifacts, history and the heritage of the gypsum mining industry in the Grand river watershed.
