## Decide Against Traffic Lights

Traffic volume doesn't justify installation of traffic controls at Lake Av. and Fifteenth St., village officials have decided.

Trustee James Schwietert told the village board Tuesday that engineers found that only a maximum of 79 cars crossed Lake on Fifteenth during a seven-hour period on Sept. 20.

"Despite the fact that an average of 900 cars pass Fifteenth on Lake in the same period, the Fifteenth St. traffic isn't heavy enough for a sign or light," Mr. Schwietert said. State approval of controls is needed because Lake is a state route.

The survey was conducted after residents of the area requested controls because children cross at the intersection on their way to and from Logan School.

The intersection is manned before and after school and during the noon hour by one of the village's 14 crossing guards.

The survey included traffic counts during peak traffic periods of 7 to 9 a.m., 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., and 3 to 6 p.m.

All members of the school, park, and village boards have been invited.

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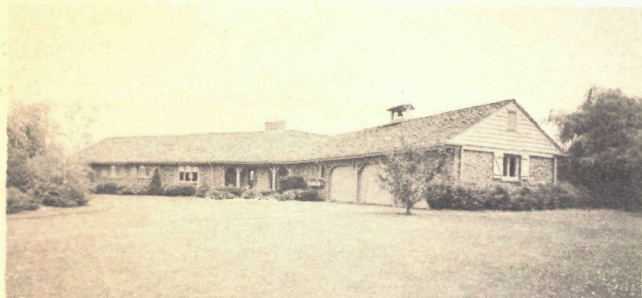
