## NINE DAY FESTIVAL

North Shore Music Lovers Delighted Over Chicago North Shore Festival Program

It appears to be generally agreed on the part of the subscribers to the Chicago North Shore Festival association's concerts who attended the festival from north shore towns, that the plan, put into operation this season, of spreading the performances over nine days is a good one. There are at least two advantages. It allows listeners an opportunity to digest the works which they have heard, and it permits of more rehearsing for the orchestra, chorus and soloists.

If only for the reason that the directors have now more time to drill their forces, the concerts this season will likely to be on a higher plane than ever before. The schedule of performances under the direction of Mr. Lutkin or Mr. Stock will be as follows:

First concert, Monday, May 24. Mendelssohn's Hymn of Praise and Hadley's "The New Earth."

Second concert, Tuesday, May 25. Tchaikowsky program. Ossip Gabrilowitsch, soloist.

Third concert, Thursday, May 27. Orchestral program with Giovanni Martinelli as soloist.

Fourth concert, Saturday, May 29. Young People's matinee with children's chorus of 1,500 and Sylvia Lent, violinist.

Fifth concert, Monday, May 31. Brahms' German Requiem and choral numbers with Mabel Garrison and Boris Salawsky as soloists.

Sixth concert, Tuesday, June 1. Orchestral program with first performance of prize composition and vocal solos by Dusolina Giannini and Lawrence Tibbett.

A program not scheduled in the regular scheme of art, will be the public rehearsal which, given in the evening, May 29, will set forth the five competing works for orchestra from which the judges will select the prize work. This will bring to its composer \$1,000.

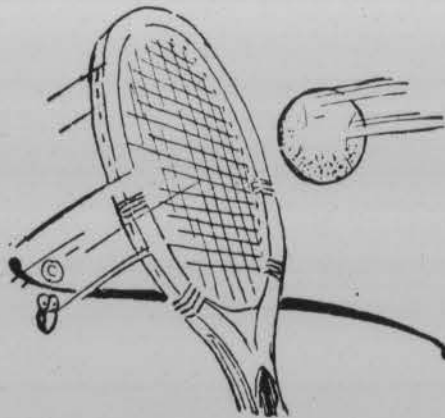
