HOLD ESSAY CONTEST

High School Freshmen and Upper Grade Children Compete for Optimist Club Awards

Wilmette boys and girls who are Freshmen at New Trier High school, as well as boys and girls in the seventh and eighth grades of the Wilmette public schools have been invited to enter an essay contest conducted under auspices of the Wilmette Optimist club which carries with it various awards and will provide an essay to be read at the Wilmette community Memorial Day exercises.

Rules of the contest, which is now in progress, have been announced as follows:

Subject: "Memorial Day. Its origin, purpose and proper observance."

Contestants: Those eligible to this contest shall be any boy or girl of the seventh and eighth grades of the Wilmette public schools, and any Wilmette boy or girl member of the freshman class of New Trier High school.

Prizes: The prizes shall be fifteen dollars for the best, ten dollars for the second best, and five dollars for the third best essay in each of the above mentioned groups.

Basis of Award: The essays shall be judged upon the basis of their originality, standard of composition and most convincing statement of the purpose of Memorial day and plan for its proper observance.

Each essay shall be limited to seven hundred words.

Essay to be in the hands of Frederick E. Clark, superintendent of New Trier Township High school not later than May 11.

The superintendent of the grade schools, together with teachers of the seventh and eighth grades, shall be the preliminary judges, selecting, provided there be submitted more than seven essays, the seven best to be submitted to the final judges.

In the high school, the preliminary judges shall be the superintendent and two teachers selected by himself, to select the seven best essays submitted. There shall be five final judges as follows: president of the Wilmette School board, commander of Wilmette American Legion Post, president of the Village of Wilmette, President of the Woman's Club of Wilmette and the editor of Wilmette Life.

Final conditions: The prizes shall be publicly awarded by the president of the Optimist club as a part of the program Memorial day, and the essay winning first prize shall be read by the writer as a part of the Memorial day program.

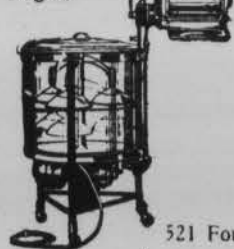
