WILL GIVE CONCERT APPOINT DIRECTOR OF **COMMUNITY RECREATION**

Man of Wide Experience to Take Charge of Community Athletics July 1

Daniel M. Davis, of Ypsilanti, Mich., has been appointed director of community athletics by the new Playground and Recreation commission, of which John Clark Baker, village trustee, is chairman. Mr. Davis will take up his duties July 1, it was announced this week.

The new playground director comes to Wilmette with a wide experience in physical education and community recreation work. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan and of the National Community Recreation school and has had three years experience as physical instructor in Michigan public schools, two years as physical director in Kansas schools and four years experience as physical director of the Terre Haute, Ind., schools.

During the war he was physical director at Camp Wadsworth, S. C. He is a member of Sigma Delta Psi, a national athletic fraternity, which numbers only 250 members throughout the entire United States.

Definite announcement of the recreation program to be followed has not yet been made, but it is thought that it will be essentially that which was outlined by the Advisory Play and Recreation committee, forerunner of the present Play and Recreation commission, last winter.

Map Play Program

At that time a comprehensive, yearround program of community recreation was mapped out, with a plan of co-operation between all village bodies to get the maximum use of all play facilities in the community.

Starting with the summer months, it was planned to have swimming, various sports and baseball, both for children and adults. Parks, school and municipal playgrounds will be used. In the fall there will be football, basketball and other sports. In the winter there is to be skating, indoor sports, and gymnasium work. In the spring there is baseball and track

Growth of the village, with the consequent elimination of play space for children first drew the attention of civic leaders to the need of adequate recreation facilities, and the Advisory Play and Recreation committee was appointed and made a study of the situation, resulting in the comprehensive plan which is now being followed.
