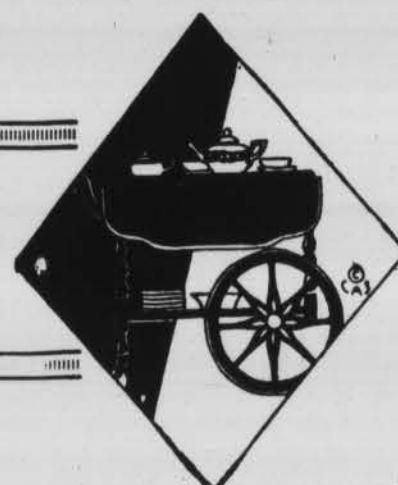




Social Events Open Women's Clubs



Opening Club Days Offer Social Hours as Well as Programs

Miss Witwer, as winner of a contest, has appeared with the Chicago Symphony orchestra in a popular concert.
