Dr. William A. Colledge, educational director of the Redpath Lyceum bureau and formerly pastor of the Kenilworth Union church, head of the department of English at Armour institute, died Sunday at Jacksonville, Fla. Funeral services held at Jacksonville this week.

He assumed the chair of English at Armour institute in 1904. Previously he had been an extension lecturer at the University of Chicago. He left educational work to enter the ministry and for several years held pastorates at Aurora and Kenilworth.
