## Parks May Secure "Ready Made" Elms, by Transplanting

The discussion relative to transplanting of Elms was prompted by a report by Trustee Drayer to the effect that Elms on parkways in some sections of the village should, according to tree experts, be thinned out so as to permit proper growth. Elms in question, it was explained, were planted twenty feet apart, whereas, experts declare, the interval of space should be not less than forty feet.

A proposition to transplant some of these Elms in the various parks, particularly the Village Green and Washington park, is being considered by the board. This work would be done in midwinter, the proper season for such procedure.
