The above resolution, presented by the Boys' Work committee of the Wilmette Rotary club, was unanimously adopted by the club at its weekly luncheon last week. The club also stipulated that a second prize will also be given.

Every eighth grade boy in the public or parochial schools of the village who has participated in the seasonal athletic sports in which the Playground and Recreation board has supported leagues will be eligible to compete for the prizes.


Sisterhood Holds First Meeting in New Temple
