They are not apt to favor the idea of spending your money in this way if they think that you are indifferent in the matter. If you let it be known that when you favored a tree ordinance you had in mind a constructive piece of work and that you would like to see it begun this year, you will find them glad to co-operate with you, and you will get results.

The members of Mr. Schultz' committee are enthusiastic and anxious to begin work.

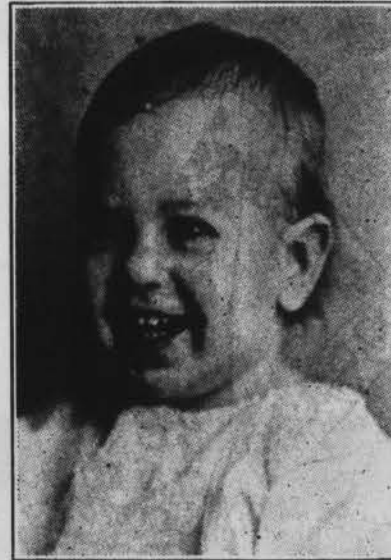
