The happiness of Sunday as a day for home and family needs to be revived, and the simpler pleasures of afternoon walks and reading of worthy books should not be supplanted by automobiles and comic supplements. Music and singing by the home talent need not be crowded out by "Canned" varieties, and the art of telling stories may be mastered by repeated efforts.

Home, as the place where the best fun of all is to be had, should not be too "nice" for the growing boy, but provide some place that is truly his own. With a sense of humor and a sense of proportion to make allowances for every member of the family. it should be possible, as Dr. Allison said, "to grow a little religion ourselves."


