## Special Assessment No. 249

NOTICE is hereby given to all persons interested that the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Wilmette, in the County of Cook and State of Illinois having ordered that Iroquois Road from Northeastly line of Illinois Road to the West Line of 23rd Street; Cherokee Road from the South line of Elmwood Avenue to the North edge of the concrete pavement on Lake Avenue; Pawnee Road, South of Iroquois Road from Iroquois Road to the North edge of the concrete pavement on Lake Avenue; Pawnee Road from its junction with Miami Road to the South-line of Elmwood Avenue; Miami Road from its junction with Pawnee Road to the South line of Elmwood Avenue; the roadway between Lots 50 and 81 of Indian Hill Estates Unit No. 2, and South of the junction of Miami Road and Pawnee Road and North of Iroquois Road; Pontiac Road from the South line of Elmwood Avenue to the North edge of the concrete pavement on Lake Avenue; Illinois Road, from the North line of Iroquois Road, West of Illinois Road, to the North edge of the concrete pavement in Lake Avenue be improved by grading, adjusting manholes and valve chambers, building catch basins, constructing concrete sidewalks, and paving all with reinforced concrete pavement, except that part of the above streets lying South of the North line of Lake Avenue, which part shall be paved with asphalt macadam, and constructing curb integral with the concrete pavement, in the Village of Wilmette, Cook County, Illinois, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the Village Clerk and said Village having applied to the County Court of Cook County for an assessment of the costs of said improvements, according to benefits, and an assessment therefor having been made and returned to said Court, Docket No. 249 the final hearing thereon will be had on the 8th day of April, A. 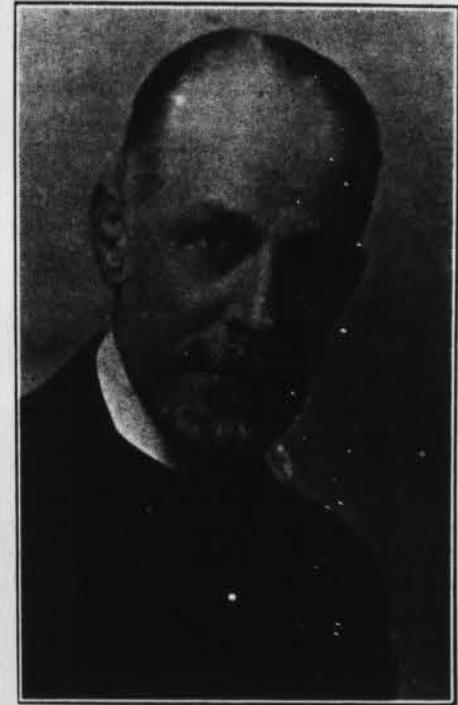
