Northwestern Students Ready to "Clean House"

An army of seventy-five Northwestern university students who are working their way through school has been mobilized to attack the Evanston and north shore house cleaning problems.

Since the organization of the employment department at the university last fall, over a hundred houses have called upon students for part-time work. General cleaning, window washing, painting, and yard work have been the most popular odd jobs handled by the student workers during the past semester, according to Lester Hafe-meister who is in charge of the employment department.

With the advent of the spring clean-up paint-up campaign the number of odd jobs held by students each week has increased considerably. Hundreds of men at the university are earning all or a part of their expenses by part time employment. A report made by the employment manager recently indicated that 270 men had received work through that office during the first semester. The employment depart-

ment is operated under the direction of the university personnel office, headed by Dr. Delton T. Howard.
