A group of boys from Australia and New Zealand, from among 160 who visited Chicago from April 25 to May 2 under the auspices of the Chicago Rotary club, were taken on a trip through the north shore last Monday which included an inspection of New Trier High school. Monday evening they were guests of the Wilmette Rotary club at a dinner and theater party in Chicago.
