

NEW TRIER "ECHOES," YEARBOOK, OFF PRESS

**Volume Is Dedicated to "Duke"
Childs, Athletic Director;
Has Many Novel Features**

New Trier High school's 1929 yearbook, "The Echoes," was placed on sale at the school Monday of this week. The editors-in-chief, Bob Marcus and Dorland Davis, are priding themselves on the fact that the book was distributed on time.

The annual is dedicated this year to Wilfred L. ("Duke") Childs, who has been athletic director at New Trier for twenty years. It contains 206 pages and the classic theme is used throughout.

Contains Six Sections

The 1929 yearbook is divided into six sections—views, administration, classes, athletics, activities, and advertisements. New features of the book this year include: individual pictures of all class officers, individual pictures of team captains and action pictures of athletic contests, three full pages devoted to the Tri-Ship Boys' club and the same amount of space to the Girls' club, with pictures of the new club rooms and officers and faculty sponsors of each club, two pages of baby pictures, group pictures of the faculty by departments, and an unusual airplane view of the New Trier campus and surroundings.

The "In Memoriam" page this year carries the names of Henry P. Williams of Evanston, members of the New Trier Board of Education from 1905 to 1923, who died last year; Leslie F. Gates of Wilmette, member of the board from 1919 until his death in December, 1928; and two students, John Ward of Glenview, and Dorothy Vir-

ginia Smith of Wilmette, both of whom died during the present school year.

Robert Carpenter was the faculty sponsor of the annual. The staff of the publication was headed by Dorland Davis and Bob Marcus, editors-in-chief, and Robert Brown, Ruth Drayer, and Kingsley Karnopp, associate editors. Following were the editors of the various departments: Martin Cassell, activities; Duncan Jennings, boys' athletics; Martha Tencher, girls' athletics; Morton Mergentheim, literary; Bill Bennett, group pictures, and Don Brockell, snapshots.

Business, circulation, and advertising managers were: Homer Hilton, business manager, and Robert Hertel, assistant; Robert Simmons, advertising manager, and William Mesick, assistant; John Fletcher, circulation manager, and Prescott Lothrop, assistant. The typing staff was headed by Virginia Conner.
