

Wilmette C. of C. Team Wins Fourth Game This Season

Another victory was added to the Wilmette Chamber of Commerce baseball team's current winning streak Sunday afternoon at the Village Green, when the Elgin Parksides were sidetracked by a 10-6 count. It was the third straight win for the locals and the fourth for the season. Only one defeat has been suffered to date.

Grant Phillips hurled beautiful ball for six frames, not a hostile player reaching first until Lymeropoulos singled to start the seventh inning for Elgin. He fanned eleven while walking two of the enemy.

Janetz Gets Four Hits

Ralph Janetz led the local barrage on Mills, with three one-base smacks and a triple to his credit. Baker followed him closely for swatting honors with three singles and a walk. Kassel took fielding laurels with eleven put-outs.

Neither outfit scored in the initial stanza although Janetz tripled to begin the local's half. In the second, however, the home aggregation counted twice.

Baker singled after two were out. Robinson was hit by a pitched ball. Phillips hit safely and Baker scored. Robinson came home on Janetz' second single.

Score Three in Third

Three markers were chalked up for Wilmette in the third. Smith doubled to left and Borre drove him over the pan with a single through short. Liepe strolled. Kassel sacrificed and Baker's second one-sacker brought both runners around.

One local tally was added to the score in the fourth. Janetz singled, went to second on a wild pitch and counted on Smith's safe smash.

Janetz again figured in the scoring in the sixth. He sent Robinson to the plate with his fourth hit after Bal had tripled to right center.

Elgin Draws Blood

Elgin finally entered the run column in the seventh. Lymeropoulos singled. Moser got a three-base smash and he also counted when Robinson's throw to pick him off third went into left field. Osmun then walked, stole second, went to third on an error and tallied on W. Buhrow's sacrifice fly.

The home crowd had something to root for in the eighth. A three-ply swat by Porterfield, a sacrifice fly by Kassel and singles by Borre and Liepe, coupled with a balk by Mills, accounted for three runs.

The visitors came back in their half of the final period and garnered a trio of markers on Moser's double, singles by the Buhrow brothers, and a bad throw by Liepe.
