Reuter, pastor of Redeemer Lutheran church of Birmingham, Ala., will deliver the sermons. Pastor Reuter was a classmate as well as roommate of the Rev. Herman W. Meyer at the preparatory school as well as at Concordia seminary. An offering for missions will be taken at these services, and all members are requested to use their mission envelopes for July. We hope that all members will make it a point to hear Pastor Reuter's message. Friends and visitors are cordially invited to all of our services.

On next Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock a great celebration commemorating the 400th anniversary of the Lutheran catechism will be held at Soldiers field, Chicago, also known as the stadium. All of the Lutheran churches of the Missouri synod of Chicago and vicinity will participate in these festivities, a feature of which will be the singing by several thousand children of the parish

and Sunday schools of these churches, and the music of a choir of 2,500 voices gathered from the choirs of the same churches. The Rev. Walter Meyer, Ph. D., of Concordia seminary, St. Louis, editor in chief of the Walther League Messenger will deliver the address of the day.

The triennial convention of the Lutheran synod of Missouri, Ohio, and other states will be in session from Wednesday, June 19, to Friday, June 29, at the gymnasium of Concordia Teachers' college, River Forest, Ill. Sessions will be held daily from 9 to 12 and 1:30 to 4. Delegates from all over the world will be present, and it is estimated that one thousand official delegates will constitute the deliberative body. Visitors are cordially invited to these sessions, and since the hall can conveniently accommodate about 1,500 to 2,000 people a large gathering of guests is expected to attend the meetings. A daily convention record is being printed and sent out to those who subscribed for it.

GOING TO COLLEGE

Two-thirds of Members of 1929 Graduating Class at New Trier High School to Continue Their Education

Two hundred and eighteen of the 328 graduates at New Trier High school this year have announced their intention of going to college next fall. This represents two-thirds of the entire graduating class who expect to continue their education without interruption. The figures, which are only approximate, are based on lists of credits mailed to the various institutions and on verbal expressions by the students of their intention to go to college.

Of the 218 who will continue their schooling next fall, Northwestern will draw the largest number—fifty-one, almost a fourth of the total. Illinois is second with twenty-four, and Wisconsin third with twenty-three.
