Four visiting professors on the summer quarter faculty of Garrett Biblical Institute, which opened Monday, are Mrs. A. Starr Best of Evanston, founder of the Drama League of America; Dr. L. R. CONDUCT ANNUAL M. E. CAMP AT DES PLAINES

Bishop E. H. Hughes of Wilmette and Garrett Professor Deliver Addresses

Many speakers prominent in Methodism and religious educational work, among them Bishop Edwin H. Hughes, of Wilmette, and Prof. W. D. Schermerhorn of Garrett Biblical Institute, will take part in the program arranged for the annual Des Plaines Camp meeting, now being held at Des Plaines, Ill. The meeting, which, as a religious assembly of Chicago Methodists, has been conducted annually for the past seventy years to assist the church in the generation of spiritual interest and inspiration, opened on Friday of this week and will continue through Sunday, July 14.

Bishop Blake Talks

The program for the coming week includes the address of Bishop Edgar Blake, of Indianapolis, at 10:30 o'clock on Sunday morning which will be followed in the evening at 8 o'clock by a sermon by Bishop Hughes. Monday, July 8, has been designated as Preachers' Day and Bishop Hughes and Prof. Schermerhorn are scheduled to speak at 10:30 o'clock in the morning and 2:30 in the afternoon respectively. Mr. Schermerhorn will also deliver an address at 2:30 on Tuesday afternoon and at the same hour on Wednesday.

A program especially suited to District superintendents has been arranged for Thursday, July 11. The session will be featured by a talk to be delivered at 8 o'clock in the evening by the Rev. M. S. Rice, D. D., of the Metropolitan M. E. Church of Detroit.

Program for Women

Dr. H. Clifford Northcott of the First Methodist church of Champaign, Ill., will present probably the outstanding address on the program arranged for women of the church on Friday. Ernest H. Cherrington, of Westerville, O., secretary of the World League Against Alcoholism, will speak at a "prohibition rally" Saturday evening.

The closing program on Sunday, July 14, will consist of three parts, two addresses by Bishop F. J. McConnell, of New York City, at 10:30 in the morning and 2:30 in the afternoon, and a communion service at 8 o'clock in the evening. Bishop McConnell is president of the Federal Council of Churches of America as well as resident Bishop of the New York City area of the Methodist church.

Two young peoples' rallies and a children's camp meeting are also being conducted in connection with the general program.

Old Kenilworth Bell to Find Place in Chapel

The old Kenilworth Village Bell, which has not been in use for many years, has been donated to the Morgan Park Baptist church for a chapel which that church plans to build at Mt. Greenwood, Ill. Action to this effect was taken by the Kenilworth Village board at its regular meeting Monday night of this week. The bell has stood for some time at the side of the small building at the corner of Melrose avenue and Richmond road which is used for various village purposes. Before Kenilworth was furnished fire protection by the Wilmette or Winnetka fire departments the old bell was used as a fire alarm.
