Entertain for Guest of Mrs. Henry R. Rathbone

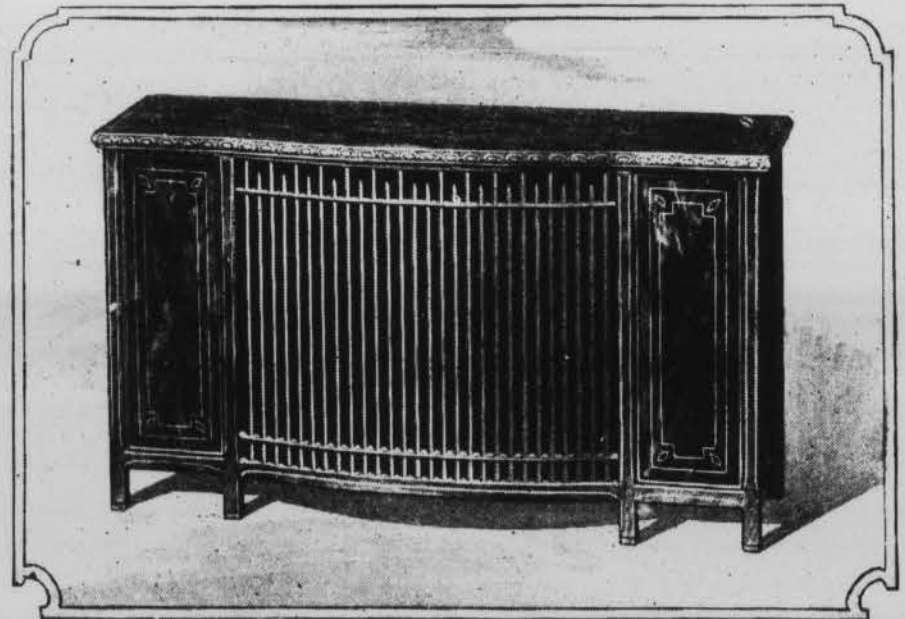
