### Greatest of World War Heroes to Speak Here

Sergt, Alvin C. York, Tennessee mountaineer who for all time is recorded in the archives of the United States War department as "a conscientious objector" and yet has been accorded the Congressional medal for bravery and distinguished service and has been termed by Gen. Pershing and Marshal Foch as the greatest of all heroes of the World war, will speak at New Trier High school on March 8, under the auspices of Wilmette Post 45 of the American Legion.

In his youth, Sergeant York was, to use his own words, "hog wild." He gambled, cussed, smoked, boozed and was mixed up in knife and gun fights along the Kentucky border. Then sud-denly, in 1912, he abandoned his wild life. When the United States entered the war, York was working on a farm and doing Sunday school work in his own little valley. The possessor of a fine tenor voice, he was known throughout the mountains as "the Singing Elder."

Came the war. York was not interested. He had tried fighting along the Kentucky border. It was not worthwhile. Called in the draft, York applied for exemption on the basis of moral and religious opposition to war. Three times, to successively higher boards and finally to President Wilson himself, York appealed. All of his pleas were denied and he found himself in the army. It took him months of reading the Bible and argument to convince him that he should go overseas and fight. But finally convinced, over he went and made history. He will tell of this struggle with himself and fina'ly with the Germans in his address March
