

## At Shawnee

The Shawnee Country club presented two well known artists in a musical recital on Easter Sunday afternoon, April 20, and in spite of the rain, there was a very large audience to greet them. Gordon Campbell, too well known as an artist for special comment, gave a solo group which included "Ballade" by Brahms, "Berceuse" by Chopin and "Polanaise Americaine" by Carpenter, as well as assisting Guiseppe Cavadore, baritone, as accompanist in his songs.

Mr. Cavadore, who was singing last week in the "Bohemian Girl" and who is remembered for his work with the Civic Opera company last season gave a delightfully varied program, including: "M'appari" (Martha) Flotow, "Nina" by Pergelesi, "Elegie" by Massenet, "Ay Ay" (Creole Song), "Rondine al Nido," by DeCresenza, "The Hand of You," Bond, "The Last Hour" by Kramer, "Duna" by McGill, "My Desire" by Cadman, and "O Sole Mio," and in addition a number of encores.

Even after the company had assembled for tea there were requests for more of the music and Mr. Cavadore most graciously sang the famous aria from "Pagliacci."

The art exhibit now hanging on the walls of the club, is of rarest beauty. Miniatures and water colors predominate on the walls at this exhibit although there are some pastels and sculpture pieces. Ten of Irma Koen's water color paintings have been loaned by the Chicago Galleries for this exhibit, and each one is a little masterpiece. Miss Koen's colors are not brilliant, but rich and somber. She paints with delicacy, in great detail, and with the hand of a draftsman. Alice Ravenal Huger Smith's works, which form an interesting contrast, are brilliant with sunlight, and although there is delicacy there is also a power which is brought out in great splashes of rich coloring contained in most of her pictures. Many of her scenes are of the Carolina swamps, phantastical and wonderfully executed. She seems to love her surroundings and in her pictures brings a rare sense of freedom and the out of doors, the wind, the sea, and the sky.

The miniatures, the largest ever presented in Chicago and its vicinity, which are exquisite things, are being exhibited by Mrs. Kate Bacon Bond, Mrs. Eda Nemoede Casterton, Lucille Stevenson Dalrymple, Mrs. Marion Dunlap Harper, Emma Hess Ingersoll, Miss Anna Lynch, Anne Martin, and Mrs. Caroline Tyler. Many of the subjects are residents of the north shore. Pastels by Mrs. Bond also reveal several striking portraits of north shore residents.

Among the sculpture pieces by Agnes V. Fromen is an interesting totem pole lamp, worked out with great detail. Elizabeth Tuttle Holsman's Lincoln Tablet with Gettysburg speech is a splendid thing, and is being sent on to a Joliet school. The exhibit will continue until May 8, and then will be taken to the Anderson galleries.

## 1,869 Students to Enroll at N. T. Next Year, View

The research department of New Trier High school, W. L. Brown, director, recently completed a survey to determine the probable increase in enrollment at New Trier next year, and Mr. Brown states that the normal increase of about seventy-five is expected. According to estimates of the research department, the enrollment next fall will be 1,869, which is sixty-eight more than at the beginning of the present school year. The enrollment this semester is about 1,775. The incoming freshman class next fall will number 536, according to Mr. Brown's figures. This year the freshman class numbered about 500.

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
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
