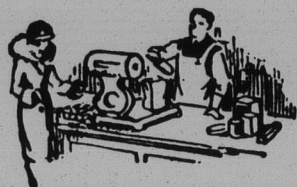

## Large Enrollment Expected at N. T. for Summer School

The enrollment at the New Trier High school summer school this year is expected to be larger than that of any previous summer session there. W. L. Brown, director, stated this week. At the preliminary registration held recently 616 students enrolled, and other registrations are coming in.

In 1927 the New Trier summer school enrollment was 701, the largest in the history of the school thus far. This year Mr. Brown expects the attendance to be between 700 and 750.

The 616 students enrolled in the preliminary registration does not include any from the private schools, and a considerable number are expected from that source. There will also be additional registrations by students now attending the regular session at New Trier High school.

The New Trier summer school will start on Monday, June 16, and run for a period of eight weeks to August 8. Classes will be held on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings from 8 o'clock to 12:40 o'clock.

Courses will be offered in practically every subject a student may desire. By attending summer school a student can make the equivalent of a half year's work in two subjects.

Among the subjects to be offered at the summer session this year are: English, algebra, geometry, economics, sociology, civics, biology, chemistry, physics, Latin, French, Spanish, commercial geography, business administration, commercial law, typing, and Greek, Roman medieval, modern and United States history.

The New Trier summer school is conducted for residents of New Trier township and there is no tuition charge. Registrations are being accepted now. W. L. Brown, director of the summer session, is urging students who expect to attend to complete their registration by June 18.

## E. H. Hansen Overcome by Gas, Revived by Firemen

Einar Holm Hansen, 45, of 511 Park avenue, Wilmette, who was overcome by carbon monoxide gas while working on his car in the garage at his home last Friday night, was revived by members of the Wilmette Fire department. The Rev. Herman W. Meyer, whose garage adjoins that of Mr. Hansen, found him lying on the floor, and the firemen received the emergency call about 9:45 o'clock. Mr. Hansen was unconscious when the firemen arrived. Using an "H-and-H" inhalator they revived him in thirty minutes. One door of the garage had been left open, but Mr. Hansen succumbed to the poisonous fumes, falling to the floor and suffering severe head cuts which necessitated several stitches. He was at his home this week and his condition is said to be improved.
