The trip through Europe will be made by private car, instead of by motor coach as originally planned, and the party will sail from Montreal on June 27 for Liverpool.

His wish was granted, and in this service his conduct was such that he was given citations by General Petain, Major George Barnett, and Major-General LeJeune for distinguished and exceptional bravery at St. Etienne and other engagements with the A. E. F.


