

Women's Golf Tournament Draws 110 Entries in Contest

Mrs. John Arends Nears Par Score on Illinois Course

Mrs. John Arends of Winnetka, a member of Kildeer Country club, broke the woman's course record at Illinois Golf club Monday, in the qualifying round of the Chicago Women's District Golf association championship tournament. With a 78, she scored two strokes better than par for the course. However, her record was broken the next day by Mrs. Melvin Jones of Lincolnshire, last year's champion, who shot a 76, for a new course record. Mrs. Arends' record was equalled that same day by Mrs. Lee Mida of Butterfield and Miss June Beebe of Olympia Fields.
