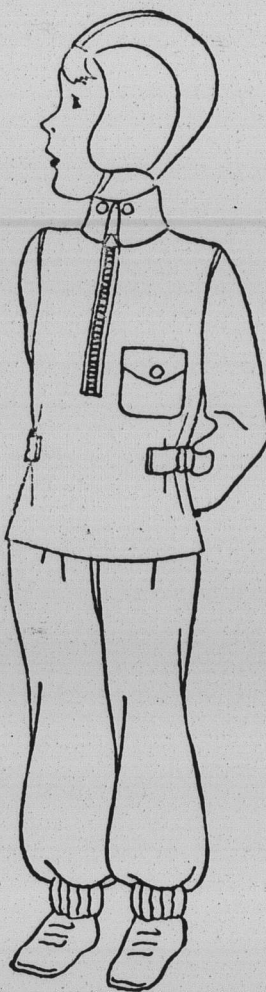

Residents Urged
to Buy Christmas
Seals from Pupils

For a number of years Wilmette public school pupils have taken care of the sale of Christmas seals in Wilmette, and this year they hope to sell more seals here than they have ever sold in the past. This is the one civic enterprise for which the children feel responsible.

Money received from the sale of the Christmas seals is the only means of support of the Chicago Tuberculosis institute, which maintains a health center in Wilmette known as the Wilmette Health center. Part of the expense of this center is borne by local agencies and part by the Chicago Tuberculosis institute.

Last year the institute contributed \$1,600 to the Wilmette Health center, while the sale of Christmas seals in Wilmette amounted to only \$1,000. Although Wilmette residents no doubt purchased more than \$1,600 worth of Christmas seals many of the seals were bought in Chicago and Wilmette did not receive the credit.

Supt. J. R. Harper of the Wilmette Public schools has requested that residents of the Village place their orders for Christmas seals this year with the Wilmette school children.

Kenilworth Man Soloist
at Program Conference

Charles Baron Fleischmann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Fleischmann, 235 Leicester road, Kenilworth, baritone, was a soloist at the conference of club presidents and program chairmen at Fullerton hall in the Art institute, November 20.

Mr. Fleischmann is in the third generation of a family of distinguished singers. Sarah Baron Anderson, his grandmother, a noted contralto, sang sacred and concert songs for many years in New York. Sara Anderson, his aunt, dramatic soprano, has sung opera in Berlin, Paris, and London.

Mr. Fleischmann was born in Buffalo on December 2, 1907, and has received all of his musical education in the United States, studying voice under Joseph Regneas of New York, where he has sung in operetta.
