

**STORE IS CROWDED**

**Marshall Field's Celebration of Anniversary Continues This Week; Greet Great Crowds**

Crowds have thronged the aisles of the Evanston store of Marshall Field & Company this week to participate in the big store's celebration of its first anniversary in Evanston. The celebration, which began last Friday with a tea at which members of the Evanston Junior League were hostesses, a fashion show, with mannequins displaying the latest styles and many other events throughout the store, will continue through Saturday, Nov. 29, when the store will remain open until 9 at night as usual.

The anniversary celebration will come to a climax Friday and Saturday when the store re-opens after the Thanksgiving holiday. The enlarged Toy section will open Friday and Santa Claus, jollier than ever, will arrive to greet the children. A feature of his arrival will be a bagful of toys from which children may "grab" a toy at ten cents a grab.

The holiday tables, set by members of the Junior league, will be on exhibit until the celebration ends Saturday evening, and the exhibit of lithographs and etchings by Jerome Robert Cerny, well known Lake Forest architect, also will remain.

Saturday, the final day, there will be a book party for children in the book section and afterwards children are invited to go to the second floor and shake hands with Santa Claus.
