LEVY \$15,000 FOR TOWNSHIP

Ordinance Adopted at Annual Town Meeting Tuesday; to Omit Road Levy

An ordinance levying taxes in the sum of \$15,000 for the year 1931 was passed at the annual meeting of New Trier township held at the Village hall in Winnetka Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

This amount is the same as the annual requirement for the township. other than for road and bridge purposes, levied for each of the past

The township highway commissioner makes his levy in September, but as will be noticed in Commissioner James A. William's annual report, elsewhere in this issue, he is withdrawing the 1930 tax levy, and, should conditions warrant, says he will not levy a tax for the year 1931.
The various items and their respec-

tive amounts in the tax levy ordinance passed Tuesday, follows:

The sum of \$3,800 for salaries and fees of township officers; \$800 for health work; \$2,000 for election expenses; \$500 for thistle eradication: \$800 for supplies and publication of notices; \$4,500 for premiums on fidelity bonds of township officials; \$2,600 for contingent expenses. Totals, \$15,000.

The annual Town meeting was called to order by Mrs. Margaret S. Pierson township clerk, and Mrs. Gertrude M. Thurston, township supervisor, was elected moderator. The minutes of the annual meeting last year were read and approved. as were the annual reports of the Supervisor, and treasurer of the road and bridge fund.

The supervisor's report of the Town fund, for the year, showed receipts of \$15,131.33, with expenditures of \$10,205.62, with a balance on hand of \$4,925.71.

The treasurer's report showed total receipts in the road and bridge fund for the fiscal year ending March 31 of \$33,822.66. The expenditures were \$32,327.27, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,495.39.
