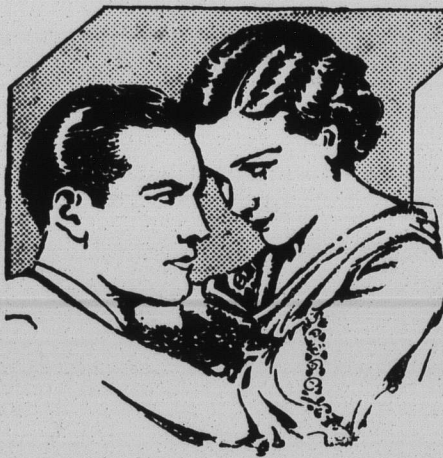

Teatro del Lago Offers Triumphs of Talking Screen

Modern and Neat Drama
