Twenty-Five New Cases of Diseases Reported

Twenty-five new cases of contagious diseases were reported in Wilmette by the Wilmette Health department for the week ending Tuesday, May 19. Twelve of these were new cases of measles, ten were mumps, two were scarlet fever and one was chicken pox. There are still active in the Village seven old cases of measles and one each of mumps and whooping cough, the Health department reports. Last Saturday at the Health department offices in the Village hall fifty-eight children were given toxin-antoxin inoculations for immunity against diphtheria. Eighteen of the children received their first inoculations, while the forty others received second inoculations. Three inoculations are required.
