Martin Lauer Accuses Wilmette Village Board

Martin W. Lauer, 1114 Forest avenue, who was one of the leaders of the group opposing the building of a municipal water works and water supply system in Wilmette, accused the Village board at its regular meeting Tuesday night of making no sincere efforts to obtain from Evanston a reduction in the price it charges Wilmette for water, seven cents per hundred cubic feet. On the other hand, Mr. Lauer said, the Village officials merely told Evanston that Wilmette intends to build its own water works, as authorized by the voters at the special election on December 5. After Mr. Lauer had spoken for a short time Trustee A. W. Froehde rose to a point of order and objected to any further remarks by Mr. Lauer. The board concurred in Trustee Froehde's objection.

Wilmette Firemen Make Seven Runs in a Week

Wilmette firemen made seven runs in the week ending Tuesday, February 2, but only two of the fires resulted in any material damage.

Monday morning about 5:20 o'clock the firemen received a call to extinguish a blaze at the Clarence A. Woodruff home, 1513 Maple avenue. The fire started from a defective chimney, according to Fire Chief Walter Zibble, who estimates the loss to be about \$1,000.

Another early morning fire which resulted in damage amounting to about \$1,000 occurred at the W. H. Fuller residence, 1201 Elmwood avenue, Tuesday about 4:40 a. m. Rubbish near the furnace in the basement caught fire. The damage was confined to the basement.

An overheated stove caused a slight fire at the Joseph Schmidt home, 719 Harvard avenue, last Friday afternoon, but the damage was negligible. Four other runs were made by the firemen in the past week all to extinguish fires of minor importance.

OUTER HIGHWAY PARLEY THEME

Plan Commissions Hear Varied Views on Proposition to Meet Future Traffic Needs

A joint meeting of plan commissions in the communities from Evanston to Lake Forest, inclusive, was held at the Winnetka Village hall Thursday evening of last week for the discussion of future lake front plans.

According to Robert Kingery, executive secretary of the Chicago Regional Planning association, the Winnetka Plan commission, of which Eugene A. Rummel is chairman, conceived the idea of the meeting. Mr. Rummel presided.

Using lantern slides to illustrate the water front development in Chicago, Linn White, chief engineer of the South Park district, and High E. Young, consulting engineer of the Lincoln Park district, explained work already accomplished and future plans.

Show Evanston Plan

Mayor Charles H. Bartlett of Evanston, explained that the city has worked out tentative plans for continuing the lake front traffic route up to the Wilmette line, and pictures of the proposed plans were shown.

Mr. Kingery explained that the Winnetka Plan commission was considering what it should do with the future increased lake shore traffic; whether it is advisable to continue the outer drive or divert west through the built-up sections.

Proposes West Route

Si Mayer said he had long advocated an outer drive from Sheboygan, southward around the lake to the Michigan state line.

Arthur Fisher of Winnetka made an urgent appeal to divert traffic westward to through highways and thus preserve the present natural beauty of the lake shore.

J. D'Esposito, prominent engineer, warned that, "when you fill the lake, you are intruding upon nature," and hoped, "these planners will keep in mind the importance of retaining the view of the lake."

"You should look well into the future," he said, "in order that you may get the best plan, so future generations will bless you."

William Sherman Hay, 645 Sheridan road, Winnetka, warned the planners to "not destroy your lake."
