the Village of Glencoe, \$85,500, and the Glencoe Park district, \$18,700.

The one consoling fact revealed in the compilation of the foregoing figures, is, that in addition to Avoca school district No. 37, (northwest Wilmette) the Wilmette Park district, Winnetka Village, Winnetka Park district, Kenilworth Village and Kenilworth Park district, have not, thus far, been compelled to issue anticipation warrants against the 1930 taxes.

The retirement of the more than \$1,500,000 of warrants issued, which may be effected only by a liberal and prompt payment of the 1930 taxes now in collection, would place the several taxing bodies in position to issue additional warrants against the 1931 and 1932 taxes and in that manner provide necessary funds to keep open the schools and maintain municipal service.

Again, taxpayers are urged not to

withhold payment of 1930 taxes on the grounds that a reassessment may be ordered. The Schnackenberg bill recently enacted by the state legislature, guarantees that in case property was over-assessed the taxpayer will receive full credit, plus interest, on taxes paid on the 1928, 1929 and 1930 assessments. There is no excuse for not paying your taxes now, it is emphasized. The taxpayers are fully protected.

The failure to pay taxes, it should be borne in mind, results in the closing of schools and the curtailment of civic service. In urban sections of this nature, the maintenance of value of property, to say nothing of increase in values, depends on the support of these local taxing bodies.
