Laundry Tour May 10 Woman's Club Benefit

They will see modern inventions of the "machine age" applied to laundering. The hours are from 1 until 5 o'clock. There is no cost for the trip.

The tour is under the auspices of the ways and means committee of the club of which Mrs. Luther W. Benson is retiring chairman. Mrs. George Iliff and Mrs. Earle D. Lyon, co-chairmen of the tours committee, are in charge. Members of the club and their friends who intend to join the party are asked to get in touch with either Mrs. Iliff or Mrs. Lyon, so that the hour may be known when they will be there. The tour will take only forty or forty-five minutes so those with other engagements, Mrs. Iliff suggests, may get in both the laundry tour and other engagements as well. The visitors will be shown the process of modern laundering from the time the bundle arrives until it is ready for delivery. The violet ray machine will be shown. The rays shine on all flat work, doing the work of five hours of sunshine. The ozone machine will be shown, which purifies the air and blows through the clothes. The process will be explained and questions answered by the guides.

After visiting the laundry, the members will be shown through the dry cleaning plant.
