Health Center News

The next Infant Welfare clinic will be held Wednesday, June 8. This clinic will not be open on either May 25 or June 1.

The next chest clinic will be held on Monday afternoon, June 20, from 1 o'clock until 3.

On Friday afternoon, May 20, at 1 o'clock Dr. Martin H. Seifert, the new health commissioner of Wilmette, will conduct immunization and vaccination at the Health Center. This immunization is being carried out as a community project, and all school children and pre-school children of Wilmette who are unable to go to their family physicians may take this opportunity of being cared for. But it is urged that all parents, if possible, take their children to their respective family physicians. However, if they are not able to do so those in charge at the Health Center will be glad to take care of the children. Mrs. Inez Bliss, community nurse, declares.

Recently Dr. Orvis, health commissioner of Winnetka conducted an immunization program at the Avoca school, district 37. The school has an enrollment of forty four pupils and thirty of these were immunized. Three pre-school children were given the toxide, twenty eight were vaccinated against small pox, and many of the children of the community were referred to their family physicians.

"The splendid cooperation on the part of the general public and the medical profession," states Mrs. Bliss, "is indeed most gratifying in these trying times. And due to this fine assistance we are still able to take care of the health of the people of our community."
