## Health Center News

Help to raise an emergency fund in Wilmette so that the standard of health in our village may be main-tained. There are men, women, and children in our midst who are not able to pay for the medicine that has been prescribed by physicians who have given their services. There are many badly in need of glasses, tonsil operations, and special diets, besides, there are babies who should have cod liver oil.

Last winter the Public Service company placed in the hands of the Wilmette Health Center \$125 to use for such emergencies among the un-employed. Now that that sum is en-tirely exhausted, the board of Health Center hopes to find organizations and individuals who will be able and glad to give something to create an-other fund to meet at least some of the most crying needs. Without it the work of the Health Center is se-riously handicapped. Many small contributors can do it, although a substantial fund for hospitalization, especially in maternity cases should be looked forward to. The board of directors of the Wil-mette Health Center is sponsoring a recreation program at the beach for children of the unemployed who espe-cially need an outing and who live too far from the beach to have its advantages. Every morning except Saturday and Sunday volunteer driv-ers will take twelve children between the ages of five and twelve at 9 o'clock and call for them at 12. After two weeks another group will go, and so on through the summer. Milk and crackers will be served in the middle of the morning. Every effort will be made to rebuild the under-weight children.

For these outings bathing suits, bath robes, and bath slippers in good condition are needed. Mrs. Rollo Gullickson, 908 Greenwood avenue (Tel. Wilmette 3656) will receive these gifts and be glad to take the names of volunteer drivers. Here is a chance to do a community service.

The dental clinic which has been conducted by the Wilmette Health Center and the Howard school will close Tuesday, June 21, and remain closed until school opens in the fall. Several hundred children of Wil-mette have been cared for by the dental clinics during the past year.

The Infant Welfare clinic will be conducted every Wednesday after-noon with the exception of the first Wednesday of each month during the summer. The hours are from 3 o'clock in the afternoon until 5. Dr. Julius Novak, medical director of the Chicago Tuberculosis institute, will conduct the regular monthly chest clinic at the Wilmette Health Center Monday, June 20 from 1 o'clock until 3 in the afternoon. This branch of the work is supported by the sale of the Christmas seals, and has been greatly increased during the past few months.

Over 300 children were immunized during the immunization program which was carried on by the health officials of Wilmette for the past four weeks. This splendid record was made possible by the excellent co-

## Announce Swim Instruction at New Trier Pool

Summer is here!

As proof comes the announce-ment by Edgar B. Jackson, New Trier High school swimming coach, that his annual summer course of swimming lessons for residents of New Trier township will begin Mon-day, June 20, in the high school pool.

The course will last eight weeks, until August 12, according to Mr. Jackson, who, as high school swim-ming coach and summer instructor, has taught a large share of the town-ship to swim in the years he has spent on the north shore.

The lessons are sponsored by the school board of the high school as a safety first measure aimed at pre-venting fatal accidents on the pop-ular beaches of the township. Many fatalities could be prevented if more people were able to care for them-selves in the water, said Mr. Jackson.

### Water Tested Daily

The New Trier natatorium is a fil-tered, daily-tested, sterilized, tile-lined pool of water twenty-five by sixty feet and is tempered to suit the needs of those who are beginners. Weather conditions do not effect the pool as the water and the air is al-ways kept the same. No dangerous holes or currents are to be feared and three instructors are in charge at all classes. Diving boards, plunge boxes, and a trapeze are provided for those who enjoy learning to dive or for performing stunts. A shallow sec-tion is prepared for the little tots.

Classes have been arranged to suit the needs of all ages and private in-struction may be had for those who desire it. All instruction is arranged so that pupils may enter at any time during the summer and progress just as fast as they are able. At present the ages run from three to fifty-five years. Although the teaching of be-ginners is emphasized, advanced swimmers and divers will find a group to suit their particular needs.

### Register at High School

New Trier's slogan is, "Be at home in and around the water." Ev-ery parent having a non-swimmer in the home is invited to take advan-tage of this opportunity and develop a family of swimmers who are not only able to take care of themselves but may also some time be of help to someone else.

Persons who wish to register for the summer swimming lessons may do so at the high school any day from 9 to 12 o'clock. Private instruction can be arranged by appointment up-on request.
