## Charles N. Roberts, Engineer, Succumbs

Funeral services for Charles N. Roberts, Wilmette village engineer for a quarter of a century, will be held this afternoon (Thursday) at 4 o'clock in the First Congregational church, the Rev. John G. Hindley, minister of the church, officiating. Burial will be at Memorial park. Mr. Roberts died of a heart attack Tuesday, August 23, at his home, 1014 Lake avenue. He had been in failing health for some time.

Mr. Roberts, who was 71 years of age, was born in the old Jefferson Park district of Chicago. He graduated from the University of Illinois with the class of 1882 and this year attended the 50th anniversary celebration of his class at Champaign. His entire business life was in the surveying and engineering field.

Mr. Roberts assumed the duties of village engineer in 1905 and served the village continuously in that capacity for 25 years. As the village grew he did the surveying work preparatory to the opening of many new streets and the engineering work for most of the paving projects in the community. He also prepared the plans for the relief sewer system which was laid beneath the old system when that became inadequate to serve the needs of the village.

The Sanitary district of Chicago cited Mr. Roberts as an excellent authority on sewer building and occasionally sent representatives to Wilmette to observe his work. He was known throughout the country as an authority in the engineering field.

Mr. Roberts is survived by his widow, Addie, and three children, Keith of Glencoe, John of Godfrey, Ill., and Mrs. E. C. Austin of Glencoe.

## N. S. Gardeners May Share Their Flowers With Poor

One of the riches of the world that the depression hasn't touched is the flower garden. The Chicago Plant, Flower and Fruit guild is well aware of this fact. Huge quantities of flowers, fruits, vegetables, sandwiches and other articles of food have been received this summer at the Guild's five receiving booths in Chicago railway stations. Distribution then is made to thirty charitable institutions in the city.

The "Flower Guild" makes it possible for the suburban gardener to share flowers, fruits and vegetables with invalids, orphans, cripples, shut-ins, with sufferers in hospitals, and with old and friendless people who are ministered to by social settlements. Of the many social agencies at work in Chicago, none duplicates the function of the "Flower Guild."

Miss Ella Dennis, social worker at the University of Chicago Settlement, wrote the following note to T. V. Purcell, president of the Guild:

"The flowers and fruit have been received with more eagerness this year than ever before. The flowers are given to the children in the playground to take home, and the fruit is given to the babies of the unemployed and sick children. We squeezed some of the oranges one day and gave cups of it to some young children, 3 and 4 years of age. It apparently made an impression, for ever since they ask for 'jus'."

"In a year of depression in a neighborhood miles from the lake with no carfare to go to the parks, garden flowers are really appreciated."

Many north shore residents are assisting in this enterprise. Garden owners who are not cooperating are urged to do so.
