Doughnuts were donated by members of the P. T. A. and sold with coffee, pop, and cider. The Fivepiece Rhythm Aces furnished music for dancing.



North Main Street


The long-awaited opening of north Main street in Wilmette became a reality last week. The section of the street from Elmwood avenue north to the Kenilworth limits, which was thrown open to the motoring public on Saturday, is the final link in the new through highway from McCormick boulevard, Evanston, to the south limits of Glencoe.

After many delays and postponements the contract for the paving of this final strip was let by the Village board, and the work was rushed to completion by the M. Foley company of Evanston.

The new through highway follows West Railroad avenue in Evanston, Main street in Wilmette, Green Bay road in Kenilworth, Center street to Tower road in Winnetka and Linden avenue through Hubbard Woods. For the major part of the distance it is immediately adjacent to and west of the Chicago and North Western railway right-of-way. Negotiations have been under way for many months to extend the road through Glencoe to the Lake county line.
