In the days of Christ there existed a large and influential sect which antagonized Him severely. These were the Sadducees. They might be called the modernists or liberals of their day. Among the doctrines they rejected was the resurrection. Our Lord rebuked them severely because of their unbelief. In the early days of the Christian church it was the resurrection of Christ and the doctrine of the resurrection of the body which experienced the most severe attacks of the heathen world. This has remained so. Yet this is one of the principal teachings of the Christian church to this day, and also one of the most hopeful. It is based on many clear passages of the Bible. It became a vital article in the first confession the church ever had, the Apostles' Creed. Pastor C. Gockel will deliver a sermon next Sunday on this article of the Christian faith. You and your friends are invited to worship with us.
