Louis Untermeyer, well known poet, critic and anthologist, who was termed by the late Amy Lowell "the most versatile genius in America," will lecture Tuesday evening, November 22, in the temple of North Shore Congregation Israel, Lincoln and Vernon avenues, Glencoe.

This is the second of a series of lectures sponsored by the sisterhood of the congregation and will be given at 8 o'clock.

Mr. Untermeyer's record of achievement in the fields of poetry; parody and criticism are almost without parallel. He is America's most widely read poet at home and abroad and his volume of essays, "Heavens," was widely acclaimed as the most clever and brilliant work of criticism that America has produced. Mr. Untermeyer is a native of New York City and is a young man in his early forties.

**PAY BACK TAX,
BOARDS' PLEAD**

ance of the county or state, then only 30 percent of your taxes are subject to any adjustment to bring equity to all.

"With the percentage of collections as low as that shown above for 1930, there can be no hope that banking support can be had beyond that already attained in the sale of tax warrants. When 1931 tax payments start, they must first be utilized to pay off warrants heretofore sold. Consequently the primary source of funds at the present time rests in the collection of delinquent taxes for 1928, 1929 and 1930, and unless such payments are made by those of you who are withholding at the moment, the continuance of local school and governmental functions and services must eventually stop.

Schools Face Shut-Down

The grade school is financed only to February 1, 1933. The Village is financed not much beyond that.

"Notwithstanding the strenuous efforts being made to curtail budgets and tax levies, the reductions are not going to be as great as they should be so long as we must continue to include in our budgets an allowance for unnecessary interest on tax warrants occasioned by the present delayed payments.

"The machinery by which tax collections will be enforced through the sales of property for taxes or forfeiture to the state is all too slow to effect a cure to financial ailments. If we must await tax sales, our finances in the interim will collapse. We want all of you to fully realize that unless payments are forthcoming on 1928, 1929 and 1930 taxes, the schools will be forced to close, and shortly thereafter police protection and other local governmental services will be severely curtailed if not entirely discontinued.

"We urge that such taxes be paid AT ONCE since a considerable period elapses between the time of payment to the county treasurer and the receipt of funds from him by the local treasurers."
