**Start Diphtheria
Immunization Here**

In a second letter sent to parents this week the Wilmette Health department reminds villagers that Friday, December 2, is the date set for the beginning of immunization treatment for diphtheria among Wilmette children. The letter, which explains how the immunization work will be conducted, follows:

"Friday, December 2 is the day set aside in your local physician's office to begin immunization treatment for diphtheria, as announced last week. The younger children will begin their first dose of toxoid at that time, while the older ones will begin the Schick test to determine whether they need treatment, as a fair percentage of these will be found already immune. Last week we told of the need for immunization against this dread disease; this week we wish to call your attention to the simplicity and safety of the necessary procedures.

"Practically all of the younger age group are susceptible to diphtheria and therefore in this group, the test for susceptibility is omitted. Toxoid which is not a serum, a serum preparation is given, and the Schick test used only after a lapse of several months to determine whether treatment has been sufficient to produce immunity, or whether an additional dose will be necessary.

"In the group above seven years, as a rule the Schick test is done first. If it shows immunity, no treatment is necessary. If not, then toxin-antitoxin is used, and this is made from sheep serum and therefore does not produce sensitization against horse serum, as the older preparation did. If your child subsequently must be given tetanus or diphtheria antitoxin for any reason, this treatment will not interfere with administration of those preparations, as they are made from horse serum. Reactions to the treatment are unusual, and when they do occur usually take the form of a low grade fever persisting for not more than 24 hours. Local reaction may occur, producing slight swelling, considerable redness and tenderness at the site of the injection, but is not at all an essential part of the treatment and when it does not occur one must not feel that the treatment did not 'take'.

"Let us remind you again to call your physician's office now and make your appointment for Friday, December 2, or if you need free treatment, to get your application at once from your school nurse, or the Health Department office."
