Preston Placed on All-Illinois Prep Grid Squad

Preston, 1031 Greenwood avenue, Wilmette, was selected as a member of the Illinois all-state high school football team by Rocky Wolfe, sports writer for the Chicago Daily Times, who also handles publicity for the Chicago Bears and Chicago Cardinals, professional football teams.

Preston is a junior at New Trier High school and has played end on the New Trier team for two years. He is sixteen years old, the youngest member of the all-state team. Only one other boy picked on the all-state team had had less than three years' experience as a member of a high school football eleven. Preston was placed at end on the all-state team.

Wins Other Honors

In addition to winning the all-state honor, Preston also was selected on the Chicago Daily News all-Chicago area first team, as well as on the all-Suburban first team selections of three Chicago evening newspapers, the News, American and Times.

Seven of the eleven boys on the all-state team are from downstate and four are from Chicago area. Sam Whiteside, Evanston High school center, and Joe Ellis, Lake Forest academy back, also made the team.
