

High School Boys Discuss Problems at N. T. Session

About 100 boys representing sixteen Illinois high schools attended the boys' club conference at New Trier High school last Saturday. The meeting was sponsored by the Tri-Ship club at New Trier, which is one of the most active high school boys' clubs in the state.

Dr. S. A. Hamrin of the School of Education at Northwestern university, who was to have addressed the boys at the morning session, was unable to be present because of illness. Instead, Frederick A. Kahler, dean of boys at New Trier, gave a talk.

The conference was opened at 10 o'clock in the morning by John Balenger, president of the Tri-Ship club, who welcomed the visiting boys on behalf of the club. Supt. M. P. Gaffney of New Trier spoke briefly, after which the New Trier boys' octet sang.

Dean in Address

Mr. Kahler then gave his talk on services which a boys club can perform in a high school. Problems confronted by boys' clubs in East Aurora, Deerfield and Lindblom High schools were discussed by boys representing these schools. William Fowler spoke for East Aurora, Gordon Kelly for Deerfield and Hal Auerbach for Lindblom.

These talks were followed by an hour of general discussion on boys' club activities and problems. After the discussion the boys had lunch together and then watched the Suburban league ping pong tournament.

A. F. Hammesfahr, who is well known throughout the Chicago area as an official at athletic contests, talked to the boys at lunch. Mr. Hammesfahr stressed particularly the value of initiative.

16 Schools There

The sixteen high schools represented at the conference were: Senn, Schurz, Roosevelt, Lindblom and University High of Chicago, Maine Township, Thornton Township, Blue Island, Austin, East Aurora, Riverside, Morton, West Aurora, Deerfield, Evanston and New Trier.

In addition to the boys who attended, faculty sponsors of the various boys' clubs also were present.

One of the principal reasons for holding the conference was to enable boys of the different high schools to become better acquainted with each other on a basis that is not competitive, as well as to give the boys an opportunity to exchange ideas on the work of their organizations.

F. D. Frisbie, faculty sponsor of the Tri-Ship club at New Trier, said this week that he felt the conference had fulfilled its purpose with marked success.

and the fashion revue will commence at 1:30.

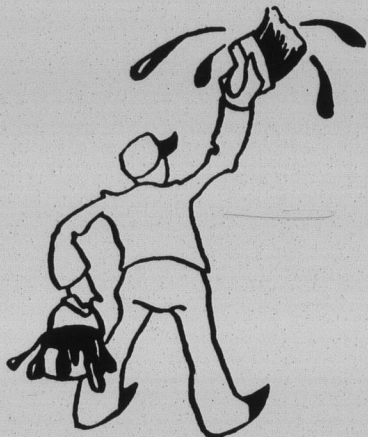
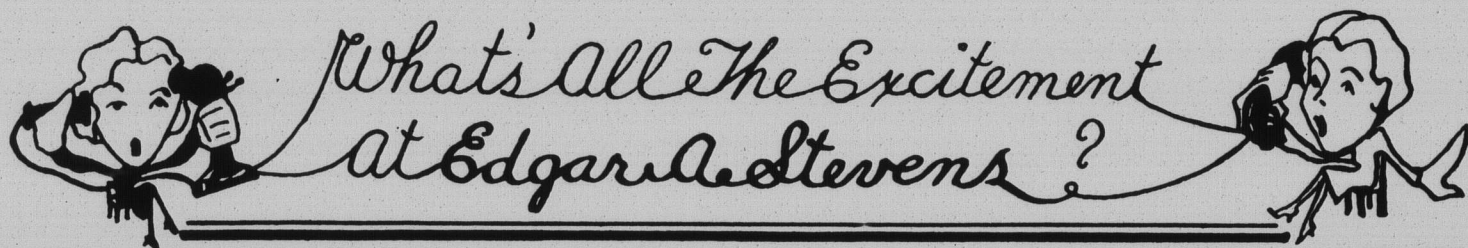

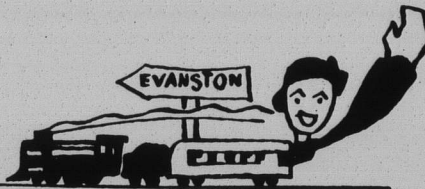
