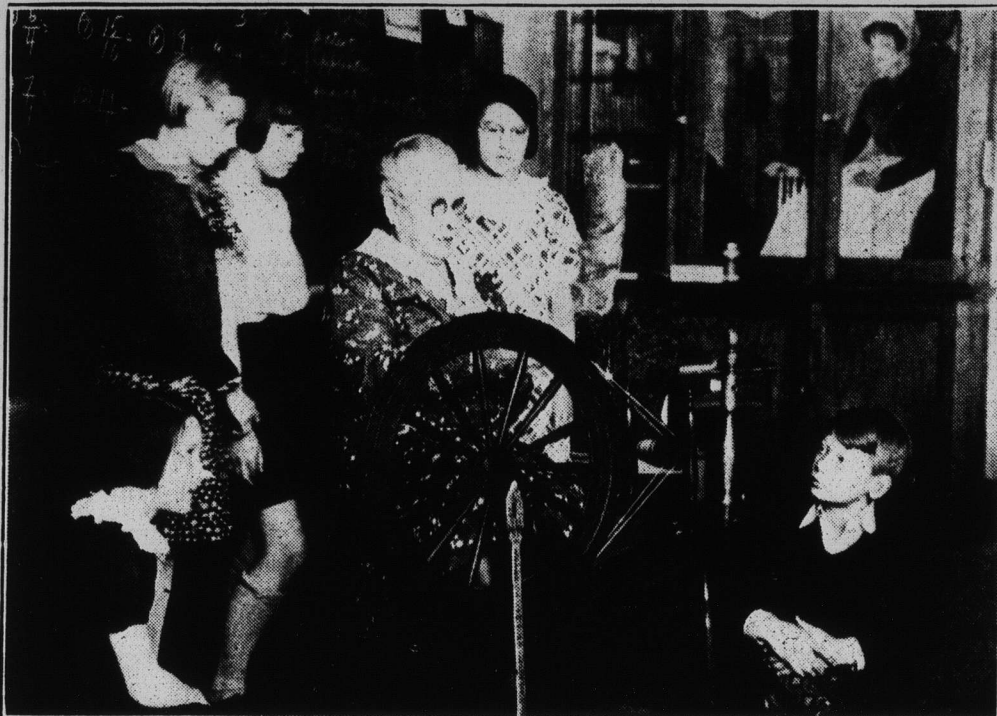

Albert W. Craig, 211 Ninth street,
