no authority to permit the storage or sale of beer, but that the transportation and delivery of the beverage to the ultimate consumer should be permitted.

Want Merchants to Benefit

The opinion was expressed that if this can be done through the local merchants acting as agents of the consumers, in making purchases outside of the municipalities, the charter restrictions would not be violated.

The hope has been expressed that there may be co-operation of this nature on the part of the merchants until the passage of laws at Springfield, when the villages will then know what further steps may legally be taken.

In Evanston an injunction has been filed against the enforcement of the charter provisions, it is announced.




