Summon Citizens to Join in Memorial Day Rites Tuesday

Legion Committee Completes Arrangements; Program to Be Held at Village Hall

Wilmette's citizenry will pause Tuesday morning, May 30, to pay tribute to the soldier dead of the nation and community.

The parade this year will form at Washington park instead of at the Village hall Green as has been the custom in the past. The line of march will lead from Washington park to the Village hall Green where the closing program will be held.

The annual Memorial Day observances, arranged under the direction of George F. Scherzer, chairman of the patriotic Celebrations committee for Wilmette Post No. 46, of the American Legion, will begin at 6:30 o'clock with flag-raising ceremonies and a cannon salute at the Village hall Green, by the legionnaires and the Wilmette Boy Scouts.

At 7 o'clock, the flag-raising ceremonies at Memorial Park cemetery will be held, followed by a rifle salute by the United Spanish-American War Veterans, Evanston Camp No. 57.

Hold Memorial Service

At 7:30 o'clock, the Legion will conduct memorial services at the grave in Memorial Park of Walter McLean, member of Wilmette post, who passed away last December.

The services at Washington park will begin at 8:30 o'clock, when Mrs. Orville G. Daily, president of Wilmette Post No. 46 auxiliary, will place the wreath on the memorial tablet.

Capt. Evers Marshal

The annual street procession will form at Washington park, leave promptly at 9 o'clock, march along various street, and terminate at the Village hall Green. Capt. Edward A. Evers, commander of the Naval Reserve training ship, Wilmette, will be the marshal, assisted by Maj. George R. Harbaugh, Maj. George Turner, and Capt. Carl Peterson and his Naval Reserve squad. "Daddy" Hood, 90-year-old Civil war veteran, will have his usual place of honor in the parade.

Included in the line of march, will be the legionnaires, the Evanston and Wilmette Drum and Bugle corps, the police department, Village officials, Legion auxiliary, New Trier High school band, Girl Scouts, Brownies, Sea Scouts, Boy Scouts, Cubs, civic groups and the fire department.

After the parade, the program at

the Village hall Green will begin, with an outstanding man as the speaker. The committee in charge of the day's activities plans to have amplifiers at the Village hall Green

The Peter J. Huerter post of the American Legion will hold a Memorial day parade in the Ridge avenue section of the village and a commemorative service at St. Joseph's cemetery next Tuesday morning (Memorial day).

The parade will start about 9:30 o'clock, assembling at St. Joseph's church and marching west on Lake avenue to Harvard street, south on Harvard street to Washington avenue, east on Washington avenue to Ridge road and north on Ridge road to St. Joseph's cemetery.

Participating in the parade, besides the members of the Huerter post, will be the Old Cross Point band, the post auxiliary, the junior auxiliary and pupils from St. Joseph's school. A firing squad composed of members of the Huerter post will fire a salute at the commemorative services in the cemetery.

The committee in charge of arrangements for the Memorial day exercises has been trying to secure Stephen A. Day of Evanston as the speaker. No definite word had been received from Mr. Day at the time this issue of WILMETTE LIFE went to press. Mr. Day spoke at the Huerter post's Memorial day exercises last year.

HEAR AUTHORITY ON LEGISLATION

James L. Donnelly to Address Civic League on Current Washington Affairs

James L. Donnelly, executive vice-president of the Illinois Manufacturers' association, will address the Wilmette Civic league at its May luncheon meeting in the Mission Tea room of Marshall Field's State street store Friday, May 26, at 12:15 o'clock. His subject will be: "What's Going on in Washington?"

"Mr. Donnelly has been in constant touch with pending legislation in Washington," reads an announcement of the meeting. "His address should be of interest to you and your friends."

Closes Current Season

Friday's luncheon formally closes the current season for the Civic league, membership in which is open to every citizen of Wilmette. President George H. Redding, in emphasizing the importance of this final meeting and urging a large attendance of members and friends, stresses the point that Mr. Donnelly will build his talk around the rapid series of developments now taking place at Washington, and will provide valuable information particularly concerning the National Industry Recovery bill now before congress.

Mr. Donnelly will also lay special emphasis upon the urgent necessity of awakening the average citizen to the importance of apprising himself fully regarding impending legislation so that he will have a definite understanding of what congress is actually doing in the enactment of legislation especially during these times of extreme emergency.

Brief Business Session

Friday's meeting will be given over practically entirely to the program, Mr. Redding assures the members and friends of the league, with a minimum of time devoted to league business.

Every member is being urged to bring a guest.

Civic league meetings are held once a month in Chicago and quarterly meetings are held in the village. The primary purpose of the league is to promote an active interest among citizens in local civic affairs and kindred matters which directly or indirectly affect the community.
