START SKOKIE JOB

Conservation Corp Men Build Camp
Preparatory to Launching Great Re-
forestation Project

In preparation for the actual work
that is to make a park of Skokie
marsh, great activity is now going
on at Skokie boulevard and Willow
road, where a camp is being laid out
for the workmen who are to perform
the magic feats. Tents are being set
up and the grounds are fast taking
on the appearance of a military camp.
This camp will provide quarters for
an advance guard of four companies
of the civilian conservation corps
which will reforest the marsh, con-
struct lagoons and otherwise beautify
the region. All this is a part of the
federal reforestation scheme now be-
ing put into effect in many parts of
the country.

Another company which is to clean
up the north branch of the Chicago
river in an attempt to solve the mos-
quito problem for the north shore,
will be camped at Harms and Glen-
view roads, in the forest preserve.
The five companies number 1,150
men, and they are under the com-
mand of Major E. C. Seaman of the
61st coast artillery. For several
weeks past a group of sixty engi-
neers and surveyors have been en-
gaged in surveying the marsh. These
were furnished by the emergency re-
lief commission.

This project, which has, of course,
been approved by President Roose-
velt, was conceived and proposed by
President Emmett Whealan and Supt.
Charles G. Sauers of the forest pre-
serve district, which owns the 4,000
acres comprising the marsh.
