## Adopt Novel Plan to Secure Funds for Church Needs

Out of the economic depression is coming a more effective business organization for the churches and a more aggressive financial system. This was revealed with the announcement from the office of Bishop George Craig Stewart of a novel plan for reinforcing the financial status not only of the Episcopal diocese of Chicago as a whole but of all of the approximately 150 churches in the diocese individually, including St. Augustine's church in Wilmette, Christ church in Winnetka and St. Elisabeth's church in Glencoe.

The plan is to be known as the "Bishop's Pence" and will center around the distribution of small banks or containers to each family in the diocese. Into these banks the family is asked to deposit one cent at each meal; three cents per day or approximately \$11 per year. The deposit is intended as a thank offering. On the basis of estimates drawn up by Bishop Stewart, it will be possible to obtain approximately \$400,000 per worked out, will be distributed equal-
