Paw Paw Craft Wins Regatta Off Navy Pier

Six Star boats from Sheridan Shore Yacht club competed in the open regatta held by the Chicago Daily News off Navy Pier Saturday, August 26. There were thirteen starters in this class which was won by "Bottoms Up" a visiting "Star" from Paw Paw lake in 1 hour, 40 minutes and 17 seconds. The course was a triangular one starting across a line off the end of Navy Pier, south to a mark off A Century of Progress at about 38th street, out to a mark two miles northeast and back to the starting line. A very large crowd witnessed the races from the pier. Order of finish:

At the present moment, Gemini stands disqualified for being over the line at the start, but a protest has been filed by the skippers, S. C. Pirie, Jr., and L. M. Pirie, disagreeing with the decision. A hearing has been set for Tuesday night at the Chicago Yacht club.

The Sheridan Shore boats returned to their home port at Wilmette harbor on Sunday.

The Shipping Board Trophy races, open to all Stars on Lake Michigan will be held off Belmont harbor as originally planned. These races take place Saturday afternoon, September 2, Sunday afternoon September 3, and Labor Day morning. This trophy is one of the most famous and most valuable prizes sailed for on Lake Michigan. It was donated by the United States Shipping board, the Naval Auxiliary of Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the American Legion Naval Post for one design competition. Since 1927 it has been competed for by the Star class. It is a replica of a Spanish galleon with parts assembled from sources of historical interest. After being won by Sheridan Shore for six consecutive years, it was last year won by the Bee, then of the Chicago Yacht club.

The last Friday night dance of the season will be held on the club's outdoor dance floor on the evening of September 1.

The night race to the gas buoy six miles off No Man's Land held last week was won by Gemini. Six boats competed and all were in port before 11 p. m. Ali Baba lost a rudder four miles out, but was skilfully sailed into port by skipper Clemetsen with sails alone and no further damage was done.
