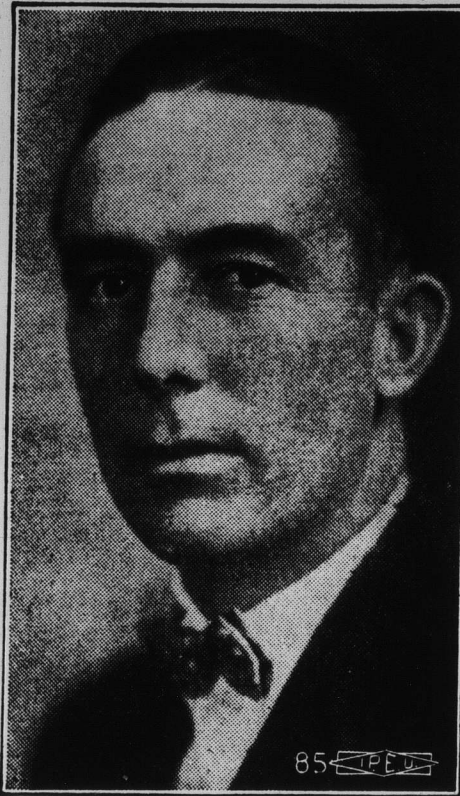

**Mrs. Mary E. Bundy, 94, Claimed by Death**

Mrs. Mary E. Bundy, 94 years old, who had been prominent in woman's club activities in Chicago and Evanston for half a century, died last Friday in Evanston. The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at St. Charles in the same home in which Mrs. Bundy was born. Burial also was at St. Charles.

Mrs. Bundy was the widow of Col. John C. Bundy, veteran of the Civil war and a member of the Loyal Legion, which is composed of officers of that war. He died in 1892. For 51 years Mrs. Bundy was a member of the Chicago Woman's club, and she had been a member of the Evanston Woman's club for 40 years.

Until four years ago, when her health began to fail, she was active in the affairs of those clubs and the Evanston chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. As a delegate of the latter organization she made a trip to Washington, D. C., after she was 80 years old. She was one of the organizers and the first treasurer of the Chicago chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. When the Glencoe chapter of the organization was formed in 1926 she was the guest of honor.

Mrs. Bundy is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Lewis W. Parker of Wilmette, five grandchildren, Mrs. Edward E. Mack of Glencoe, Mrs. R. A. Fargo of Wilmette, Mrs. Wellington Brothers of Evanston, John B. Parker of Hinsdale and Lewis W. Parker, Jr., of Chicago, and four great grandchildren.
